FROM THE WEST

Brethren and Ladies,

In the last year I started my paragraphs off with defining Masonic tools and their meaning, focusing on the plumb, square, and level which are also represented by the 3 pillars of the lodge. The plumb admonishes us to walk uprightly in our several stations before God and man, squaring our actions by the square of virtue and ever remembering that we are traveling upon the level of time, to "that undiscovered country, from whose bourne no traveler returns. This month I would like to touch on The Seven Liberal Arts and Sciences. They include: Grammar, Rhetoric, Logic, Arithmetic, Geometry, Music, and Astronomy. Grammar is the science which teaches us to express our ideas in appropriate words, which we may afterward beautify and adorn by means of Rhetoric; while Logic instructs us how to think and reason with propriety, and to make language subordinate to thought. Arithmetic, which is the science of computing by numbers, is absolutely essential, not only to a thorough knowledge of all mathematical science, but also to a proper pursuit of our daily avocations. Geometry, or the application of Arithmetic to sensible quantities, is of all sciences the most important, since by it we are enabled to measure and survey the globe that we inhabit. Its principles extend to other spheres; and, occupied in the contemplation and measurement of the sun, moon, and heavenly bodies, constitute the science of Astronomy; and, lastly, when our minds are filled, and our thoughts enlarged, by the contemplation of all the wonders which these sciences open to our view, Music comes forward, to soften our hearts and cultivate our affections by its soothing influences. We should always apply these, tools, arts, and sciences in life both inside the lodge and outside it. Let's use these to build on the lodge focusing on principals of the fraternity and brotherly love to what is already there within the lodge. KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS

Did you know that a Fraternal Order was established in America by an Act of Congress in Oct.1864 and very much reflected Masonic Rituals and beliefs? This Fraternal Order still exists today throughout the USA and Canada. In fact in California it has nine subordinate lodges with one being Loma Lodge #159 in National City on East Plaza Blvd. That Lodge was established in October of 1888.

The Knights of Pythias base their rituals around a play written in 1821 by John Banim, an Irish Poet. The play was produced in London and was about a Greek Legend of the friendship between Damon and Pythias and centered on the tyrant court of Dionysius of Syracuse.

A brief plot description is that Pythias was accused and convicted of plotting against Dionysius and sentenced to death. Pythias petitioned the king requesting a short parole that he might say his good byes to family and put his affairs in order which was deny as the king feared he would flee. Damon, his close friend, intervened and guaranteed Pythias' return or suffer his own death instead. As fate would have it, Pythias was delayed by pirates and at the last possible moment returned to save Damon and explain and apologize for his late return. Dionysius was so impressed of the friendship between the two that he gave pardons to both and wanted to become their friend, but was denied. Another reason was that the court wanted to test the two believers of Pythagorean's Schools teachings and feared they were fakes in their beliefs. MGM in 1962 made a film of the story of Damon and Pythias that can be viewed for free on the internet.
